When responding to a consultation request from the District Council, the Parish Council should give one of the following four replies:

Response	When would it be appropriate to use this response
"Parish Council have no objections"	 A small in insignificant application An application for retrospective permission when there is no objection to the work done
"The Parish Council object on the following planning grounds"	 An application where Councillors or neighbouring residents have objections – Objections must correspond to one or more of the above considerations to have any weight
"The Parish Council do not object but wish to make the following comments"	 Use when certain conditions are suggested. It is assumed that if the conditions are not applied by the District Council the Parish Council's view would be one of 'objection'.
"The Parish Council supports the application"	 Used to show a positive response, e.g. the building of a new community facility that the Parish Council had been campaigning for.
