What happens next?

We have now completed our review of East Suffolk Council.

The recommendations must now be approved by Parliament. A draft order - the legal document which brings into force our recommendations - will be laid in Parliament.

Subject to parliamentary scrutiny, the new electoral arrangements will come into force at the local elections in May 2019.

Final recommendations on the new electoral arrangements



Who we are:

- The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body set up by Parliament.
- We are not part of government or any political party.
- We are accountable to Parliament through a committee of MPs chaired by the Speaker of the House of Commons
- Our main role is to carry out electoral reviews of local authorities throughout England.

Why East Suffolk?

- In May 2018, Parliament approved the creation of a new local authority called East Suffolk Council.
- The council consists of the following former councils: Suffolk Coastal Council abd Waveney Council.
- The Commission agreed to carry out an electoral review to draw up new wards for the new council.

Electoral review:

An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for a local authority, including:

- The total number of councillors representing the council's voters ('council size').
- The names, number and boundaries of wards or electoral divisions.
- The number of councillors for each ward or division.

Our proposals:

- Based on the evidence we received, we recommend that **55 councillors** should serve the council in the future.
- We believe our final recommendations meet our statutory criteria to:
- (1) Deliver electoral equality for voters.
- (2) Reflect community interests and identities.
- (3) Promote effective and convenient local government.

Summary of our recommendations

We have considered all the submissions we received during our consultation on our draft recommendations.

The final recommendations propose that East Suffolk Council should have **55 councillors**.

Those councillors should represent 8 threecouncillor wards, 10 two-councillor wards and 11 one-councillor wards across the council.


East Suffolk should have 29 wards.
